

## Exercises: Learning HTML encoding and its relationship to css.

1. Open [stevens1950.xml](#) and [wilson1829.xml](#) from the DigEd folder (available online with the Introduction [back one chapter]).
2. Place [w3Cmin.html](#), available here, in the HTML folder inside the DigEd folder, and open it.
3. Re-save the [w3Cmin.html](#) file as [stevens1950.html](#), and then open it again and save yet another copy as [wilson1829.html](#).
4. You can begin creating these two web pages. You will copy-and-paste elements from the two [xml](#) documents into the two [html](#) documents, but using HTML code instead of XML code (sometimes they are the same).
5. If you want to add a css stylesheet to your [html](#) pages, you may re-use / re-write / edit one of the css files available online, for Chapter 1:

[style.css](#), [style2.css](#), [style3.css](#) -- and for using the latter, [huntington.jpg](#)

Put all these files, including the image file, in the [css](#) folder inside the DigEd folder. In order to add one of these css files to your web pages, the link that you would put into your [html](#) files, inside the `<head>` element, right after title, is:

```
<link rel="stylesheet" type="text/css" href="../css/[stylesheetName.css]"/>
```

Replace [\[stylesheetName.css\]](#) with [style.css](#), [style2.css](#), [style3.css](#), or a stylesheet that you have created—and remember to remove the square brackets!
